



Reportable Diseases/Conditions in Erie County

Updated as of Nov. 17, 2021

Healthcare practitioners and healthcare facilities must report the following via PA-NEDSS at <https://nedss.state.pa.us>

PA-NEDSS is Pennsylvania's version of the National Electronic Disease Surveillance System.

REPORT IMMEDIATELY: Any unusual diseases/infections/conditions including SARS as soon as clinically suspected. Reporting is not to await laboratory confirmation. Outbreaks of any kind.

The following must be reported within 24 HOURS*
